"Muhammad Ali sat throughout the whole reception and invited people to come up and take pictures with



It's being described as a descent into memory and an untold truth. But for artist Sheila Finnigan, whose exhibit of paintings opens Friday at Josef Glimer Gallery, 207 W. Superior, it is a way to let ancestral voices speak.
